AMERICAN SAMOA'S FIRST HIGH SCHOOL EDUCATORS RETURN FOR NOSTALGIC VISIT

Mr. and Mrs. Harrison Matsinger, the first high school educators in American Samoa, returned here yesterday for a two-week "nostalgic visit" sponsored by some of their former students.

The Matsingers, now retired in Honolulu, were brought to Pago Pago by the U.S. Navy in 1946 to establish the first high school. The site of the original high school was at the old Samoan Hospital in Malaloa; Matsinger was principal and his wife was a teacher.

The Matsingers left American Samoa in 1950, but they have been brought back for a visit on money raised by many of their former students and friends. They arrived on yesterday afternoon's Pan Am flight from Honolulu and were honored at a fiafia last night at Fatumafuti village, opposite Flower Pot rock.

Over the next few days the Matsingers will tour Tutuila and see some of the things that have been built since they left Samoa. They will also see the territory's instructional television system, including studio operations and a consolidated school. Friday at 1:30 p.m. they will be honored an entertainment assembly at Utulei High School, and starting at 8 p.m. Friday in Lee Auditorium they will show movies and slides of the American Samoa they knew from 1946 to 1950.

The Matsingers will return to Honolulu March 15.

GERMAN VESSEL SPEEDING TOWARDS PAGO PAGO WITH SICK PASSENGER

A sick passenger has forced the German cargo-passenger vessell Cap-Frio, bound from Los Angeles to Australia, to divert to Pago Pago.

Capt. Jim Vollmer, Pago Pago harbor pilot, said a radio message placed the 6,000-ton vessel this morning about 780 miles northeast of Pago Pago. He said the Cap-Frio is making about 16 knots, which should bring the vessel into port here sometime Friday morning.

Vollmer said he did not know if the passenger were a man or woman, nor did he know the nature of the illness. He did say that the Cap-Frio's master had not requested emergency evacuation.

INJURY HOSPITALIZES PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT EMPLOYEE

A 42-year-old Department of Public Works employee from Lauli'i is in the Hospital of American Samoa as a result of an accident yesterday at Manulele Tausala ("Lady Bird") Consolidated School, in Nu'uuli.

Kalui Utupule of Lauli'i was injured while loading garbage into a garbage removal truck. His left arm was caught in the blades of the loader.

A visiting school principal from Olosega, Manu'a, Kurt Weiss, applied a tourniquet to stop the severe bleeding of Utupule's arm. Tunufa'i Potasi, a member of educational television's field engineering crew working there, rushed the injured man to the hospital.

Utupule is confined to the hospital where his condition was listed today as "satisfactory," by Matagiese Tunoa, acting hospital administrator.

TAPUTIMU FARM DIRECTOR REASSIGNED TO CONSULTING POSITION

Takeshi Ishii, agriculturist-in-charge at the government's Taputimu Experimental and Production Farm for the last two years, has been reassigned to a position that will enable him to provide technical assistance to commercial farmers.

The reassignment is based on a steady increase of small production farms in recent years. Ishii will advise farmers how to make the most of their agricultural resources and, more generally, encourage them to gradually take over the agricultural production that is presently being assumed by the government of American Samoa.

HAWAII NEEDS WORKERS

HONOLULU -- A report issued by the Hawaii Commission on Manpower and Full Employment said critical shortages of trained workers are seriously hampering some state and government services. The report said the shortages are so critical that essential services are stopped.

According to the commission, nearly 12 per cent of the state's 927 jobs in the professional or technical personnel category are now vacant. The report noted than an an additional 9 per cent of these job categories are filed by non-resident personnel.
