W.H.C. CIVIC CENTER TO BE DEDICATED TOMORROW.

The public is invited to attend the dedication of the Women's Health Committee's new Civic Center fale in Fagatogo tomorrow morning. The dedication will get underway at 9 a.m. with a parade leading from the Fagatogo Public Market to the new fale.

The Civic Center fale, built just a few months ago, will enable the Women's Health Committee of American Samoa to sell handicrafts in a more Samoan setting than their present store in back of the Pan Am sales office.

Tomorrow's dedication of the new fale will last into the early afternoon and will include remarks by Acting Governor Owen S. Aspinall, Dr. Allen Service, director of medical services, Talking Chief A.P. Lauvao-Lolo, president of the American Samoa Senate, Mrs. Arieta E. Mulitauaopele, president of the Women's Health Committee of American Samoa, and Mrs. Fetaui Mata'afa, president of the Women's Health Committee of Western Samoa.

About 600 women in American Samoa are members of the Women's Health Committee of American Samoa.

THIRD WEEKLY PAN AM FLIGHT FROM HONOLULU BEGINS TOMORROW

A third weekly Pan Am jet from Honolulu will begin operating on a regular basis tomorrow. The flight, No. 811, will be scheduled to arrive here at 5:40 a.m. every Friday and depart at 6:30 a.m. for Auckland and Sydney.

Mike Betham of the Pan American sales office in Pago Pago said the same plane will turn around in Sydney and return here via Auckland at 1:50 every Saturday morning, leaving at 2:40 a.m. for Honolulu and Los Angeles, its point of origin. On its return from Australia, the flight will be known as No.812, Betham said.

Mail Will Be Ready Friday Mornings

Pontmistress Jane Uhrle said today that incoming air mail from Pan Am's new Flight 811 will be ready for pickup starting at 8 a.m. every Friday morning.

"We'll have to wait and see how much mail there is on the Friday plane before we can say when it will be all sorted. But we will begin sorting early, and some of it will be ready starting at 8 a.m.," she said.

The deadline for outgoing air mail to be put on Flight 812 when it returns from Sydney and Auckland is 4 p.m. Fridays. Outgoing northbound airmail remains the same for the other two weekly Pan Am planes: 3 p.m. on Tuesdays and 6 p.m. on Sundays.

OFFICIAL HERE TO REVIEW AMERICAN SAMOA WARNING SYSTEM

A thorough review of American Samoa's Civil Defense warning system will be made by a Civil Defense official from the United States. Here on an inspection tour is Roy Post of Santa Rosa, California, He is chief communications officer of the Region 7 Office of U.S. Civil Defense.

Post is expected to make recommendations for supplementing American Samoa's present warning system for hurricanes, tidal waves, and fires.

Police Commissioner Dewey Allen said Post's communications review will direct itself primarily to the creation of an adequate warning system for a nuclear attack er natural disaster.

Post, who will remain in American Samoa until March 6, will work closely with newly-appointed Civil Defense deputy director Richard H. Gebauer.

TWO MORE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENTS EMPLOYEES RECEIVE SERVICE CERTIFICATES

Certificates of 20 and 30 years of service to the government of American Samoa were presented to two Public Works Department employees yesterday.

The 30-year Certificate was presented to Liva Gaisoa of Faga'alu village, who is now a carpentry supervisor in the Maintenance and Operations Division. He started working for the government as a laborer in 1933.

The 20-Year Certificate was presented to La Lefiti of Utulei, a government plumber. Lefiti's employment with the government began when he was hired as a heavy laborer in 1940.

GUAM GOVERNOR SAYS U.S. SENATE RELUCTANT TO PASS ELECTED GOVERNOR BILL

HONOLULU -- The governor of Guam thinks the U.S. Senate is reluctant to pass a bill permitting Guam to elect its own governor.

Governor Manuel Guerrero, who arrived in Honolulu yesterday from Washington after testifying before a Senate subcommittee, said he spoke in favor of the elective governor proposal, but urged that a provision for a presidentially-appointed comptroller as a watchdog over federal funds be deleted.

Guerrero is the fifth governor to rule the territory since the Organia Act was passed in 1950. The appointed governors must answer for the way in which federal taxes collected there and rebated to the territorial government are spent.

He said there was some unhappiness in Washington about the request to delete the comptroller provision, but he went on to say "I believe the bill will pass, but this phase has to be worked out first."

HAWAII SEEKS TOURISM BOOST

HONOLULU -- Hawaii's Republican lawmakers have issued a program for tourism and transportation in the state.

The program, released in a report of the joint Republican Senate and House Committee on Travel Industry, said that there is a "vital need for vastly improved coordination of private and public efforts to meet the well-recognized problems of the industry."

The report singled out the Department of Planning and Economic Development, "thich should have been well along, with meaningful action to meet these present and future needs," but which "has not been accomplished by the Democratic administration of that department."

The Republicans want to establish a "special blue-ribbon visitor industry task force" which would put together a long-range plan and program of tourism expansion.
