The king and queen of Tonga passed through Pago Pago early yesterday as they made their way home following a vacation in England.

King Taufa'ahau Tupou IV and his wife, Queen Halaevalu Mata'aho, arrived at dawn aboard the Pan Am flight from Honolulu. The king remained at the airport to see his wife off to Fiji on the Sunday morning Air New Zealand flight. The reason for her trip to Fiji is not known.

The king departed for Tonga on his motor yacht Hifofua at about 9 a.m.

SUPREME COURT STRIKES OUT CONVICTION

WASHINGTON, (UPI) - The Supreme Court has struck down the conviction of a top aide of teamsters President James Hoffa, Charles "Chucky" O'Brien of Detroit. The high court took the action on grounds the government was guilty of eavesdropping.

O'Brien had been convicted on charges of unlawfully removing merchandise from a bonded warehouse.

The Justice Department conceded that the FBI installed a microphone in a commercial establishment owned by a friend of O'P rien.

CAMPAIGNS SEEN FUTTLE

State legislatures are waging campaigns to call conventions to overturn the Supreme Court's "oneman, one-vote" ruling that both chambers of a state legislature must be apportioned on a population basis. But most observers feel there is little chance that Congress will go along with the idea. Many congressmen fear that such a convention would open the flood gates to unlimited constitutional amendments.

AUTHOR MAKES NEW CHARGES

WILLIAM MANCHESTER, (UPI) - Author of "Death of a President," has made new charges in the controversy surrounding his book about the assassination of President Kennedy.

With the book's publication date less than one month away, Manchester made his accusations in Look Magazine this week. One charge is that Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy incited Senator Robert Kennedy -- into a "tiger-like" rage to the point where he demanded the project be abandoned. Manchester also accused Mrs. Kennedy of attempting "to suppress vital facts."

BAD WEATHER HITS MUCH OF U.S.

Heavy snow and hazardous driving warnings were issued for the north and central sections of the Midwest.

The wet snow, mixed with rain or freezing drizzle, stretched from the Dakotas to the Great Lakes.

Cold records were set for the New England region. At the opposite end of the country, gale warnings were posted for the Washington and Oregon coasts.

GOVERNORS BACK VIET NAM POLICY

WASHINGTON, (UPI) - New Jersey Governor Hughes says the nation's governors are solidly behind President Johnson's policies in Viet Nam. Said Hughes..."I never saw or felt such unity of support on Viet Nam behind the President." Hughes was referring to an all-day briefing on Viet Nam for the nation's governors Saturday. He said the governors gave Secretary of State Dean Rusk and Defense Secretary Robert McNamara a standing ovation that lasted several minutes.

SHAW HOSPITALIZED

NEW ORLEANS, (UPI) - Dr. Martin Polwer said the reason Clay Shaw has been hospitalized is for an annual checkup.

Shaw is the New Orlean bussinessman implicated in District Attorney Jim Garrison's investigation of the Kennedy assassination

MILK WAR INTENSIFIES IN U.S.

Dairy trucks are moving milk to market on the mainland under armed convoy. This is being done despite a National Farmers Organization appeal to farmers to create a milk shortage in order to push milk prices up by two cents a quart. Incidents of vandalism and destruction were reported yesterday in parts of the affected 25-state area from Idaho to New York.

Four milk trucks were shot at near Flint, and Capac, Michigan. Many of the area farmers are reportedly arming themselves with shotguns to protect their property. In Wisconsin -- an NFO member's milk house was dynamited. Madison, Wisconsin police received a hoax postcard saying the milk stored at local dairies had been poisoned.

NFO President Oren Staley expressed confidence that his groups militant efforts will pay off in milk shortages and higher prices this week.
